The Building Strong Library and Information Science Education (BSLISE) Working Group has had a very productive year in 2018-19. The BSLISE is a working group within the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA), devoted to strengthening the international quality of library and information science education (LIS), and as a result, the excellence of LIS professional practice. It emerged out of deliberations at the 2016 IFLA Satellite Meeting (Dublin, Ohio, USA) on quality assessment of LIS education programs, hosted by the IFLA Section on Education and Training and the Section on Library Theory and Research. The BSLISE Working Group is comprised of members from across the globe and is an initiative of the IFLA Section on Education and Training (SET), LIS Education in Developing Countries SIG, and Section on Library Theory and Research (LTR). At the moment the group comprises of 27 people who are from all 5 IFLA regions, representing 14 countries and 14 languages (see [website](http://bslise.org) for list of members). The White Paper was published last August after 1.5 years of BSLISE work. It presented an action plan arising from the 6 key findings of an international survey to learn the differing qualification requirements (education, certification, individual credentialing system) for library and information “professional” practice in order to develop a better understanding of the equivalence of credentials and the role of LIS education. The BSLISE worked on the following three of six recommended action areas that were identified in the White Paper.

Action A: *Develop an international resource that identifies local structures (Recommended Action 4).*
